Here is the American Sociological Associations' (ASA) AY 2001-2002 Survey of Baccalaureate and Graduate Programs in Sociology. This survey reflects the issues that chairs such as yourself have said they are concerned about and the information that you need for policy and planning purposes.

One major issue is department structure. Chairs told us that they think that an increasing share of sociology degrees (especially BA degrees) is awarded in multi-disciplinary departments. We have asked a series of questions on this topic in order to provide up-to-date information on the structure of degree-granting entities in sociology. The survey also gathers timely information on enrollments, types of majors and certificate programs, degree production, demographic characteristics of students and faculty, stipends, salaries, course loads, department growth, and student evaluations. Not all questions pertain to all departments, so most respondents will not need to fill out the entire survey.

These data will be used for aggregate analysis of sociology programs in the United States. No data from individual programs will be published or otherwise made available. Breakdowns by type of school, type of department, region of the country, and peer programs, however, can be reported. We will issue frequencies, periodic research briefs, *Footnotes* articles, reports at national and regional meetings, and information on ASA's website (www.asanet.org/research/). As in the past, we will provide "I'm meeting with my Dean, I need the data yesterday," information to the best of our ability.

Please answer the questionnaire and return it in the enclosed envelope to the Indiana University Center for Survey Research. We have tried to capture the issues of concern in clear, simple and useful fashion. Because the issues that chairs deal with are not simple, you may have questions when filling out the form.
